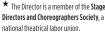














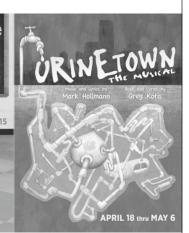

Alabama Story Playwright's Notes

Alabama Story playwright Kenneth Jones shares what attracted him to the real-life story behind his Southern-set historical drama, and what emerged in the writing process.

I draw on many sources to get ideas for the plays and musicals that I write. Alabama Story is the result of my passion for reading newspapers. I grew up reading papers, began my writing career in journalism and can't imagine a world without the daily routine of digesting headlines.

In May 2000, while reading the New York Times, I came across the story of Emily Wheelock Reed, the former State Librarian of Alabama who had been challenged by a segregationist state senator in 1959. Senator E. O. Eddins demanded that a children's picture book — Garth Williams' The Rabbits' Wedding, about a black rabbit marrying a white rabbit — be purged from the shelves of Alabama libraries on the grounds that it promoted race-mixing. Their conflict was reported worldwide. Before I finished reading the article. I knew this was an idea for a play.

Strong characters and richly contrasting conflicts rarely just fall into my lap, but that's exactly what happened here. Vivid opposites — male and female, black and white, insider and outsider. Southern and Northern, private and public, child

and parent, purity and ugliness — were immediately evident in this forgotten slice of American history. Knowing that Montgomery, Alabama, is so highly charged, historically, as both the Cradle of the Confederacy and the Cradle of Civil Rights helped my imagination to blossom further.

The elements from real life were so bold that they seemed to jump out like the cutouts in a pop-up children's book. I followed their lead and I gave them a wrangler in Garth Williams himself, who speaks directly to the audience and assumes multiple roles in this land that I call The Deep South of the Imagination, (Williams' indelible illustrations were likely part of your childhood — he created the art for "Little House on the Prairie." "Charlotte's Web." "Stuart Little" and more.) I never approached my play as a dry docudrama; the goal was to make it "pop up" in a way that can only happen in the theatre.

Emily Reed's story was widely documented in newspapers and magazines at the time, so a lot of source material existed, allowing me to steal and expand upon the actual

language and public personalities of the participants. In fact, some of the most outrageous and theatrical language in the play, from the saber-rattling senator, is not made up. You know how playwrights sometimes explain their process as "the play wrote itself"? Well, in many ways Senator Higgins (as I renamed him) wrote himself.

The process of creating *Alabama Story* included research visits to Montgomery, Selma and the senator's hometown of Demopolis, Alabama. I toured the State Capitol, walked the halls of Emily's library office in the State Archive Building, wandered antebellum homes and gravevards and city parks and museums. I interviewed local historians and librarians and residents. I touched copies of the very newspapers that first reported this unique tale of Civil Rights through the lens of censorship.

The trip to Demopolis was particularly inspiring. It's not only Senator Higgins' stomping ground, but what I imagined as the childhood home of two characters who appear in the play's reflective story.

Joshua and Lily, a black man and a white woman who were once childhood friends in that small town, reunite in Montgomery the same year that the library battle is being waged. They are meant to suggest the private heart of the public controversy. Like the others in the play, they have a deep connection to books and reading, and the quality of their character will be challenged in their exchanges. I view Alabama Story as a mash-up of some of my favorite kinds of plays — courtroom thriller, memory play, romance, historical drama — but underneath all of that is a script about how character is tested in a time of great social change. How will you behave toward others when your world is turned upside down?

I hope that *Alabama Story* sparks a memory of a beloved book, the person who gave it to you and the day that you realized that a "turning of the page" could be both terrifying and wonderful. Maybe it will also be a reminder that no matter what our differences, on some level, we all share the same story.

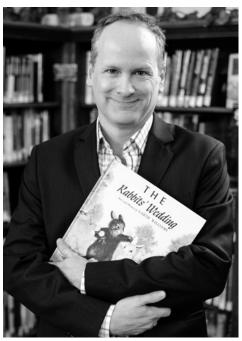

Kenneth Jones is a New York City-based playwright, librettist and lyricist. His play Alabama Story was a 2016 nominee for the Steinberg/American Theatre Critics Association New Play Award and 2014 Finalist in the Eugene O'Neill Theater Center's National Playwrights Conference. It had its world premiere by Pioneer Theatre Company in Salt Lake City in 2015, where it set a box office record, following readings by Alabama Shakespeare Festival, Pioneer and Off-Broadway's TACT/The Actors Company Theatre. By May 2018, it will have been produced in at least seventeen cities around the U.S. His play Two Henrys, a two-time Semi-Finalist in the O'Neill NPC, had developmental presentations by Pioneer Theatre Company, Hudson Stage Company in Westchester County, NY, and Pacific Resident Theatre in Venice, CA. His Hollywood, Nebraska was developed in Off-Broadway's 2016 NewTACTics New

Play Festival and received a workshop production by Wyoming Theater Festival in summer 2017. He is working on a new musical and several new plays, including one that is a current Semi-Finalist in the 2018 O'Neill NPC. With Karen Azenberg, he co-conceived the holiday musical It Happened One Christmas (Pioneer 2015). His darkly comic Christmas revue Naughty/Nice (with composer Gerald Stockstill) was performed at Caroline's On Broadway and is published by stagerights.com. His musical Voice of the City (with composer Elaine Chelton) was developed by York Theatre Company and Human Race Theatre Company. He is a member of the Dramatists Guild, BMI and The 72nd Street Gang Playwrights Collective. He writes about his own plays and advocates for other playwrights, new plays and theatre makers at his website ByKennethJones.com.

This play shows how stories, even fictional ones, can be integral to history. Alabama Story takes place in 1959 during the rise of the Civil Rights Movement. Rosa Parks was arrested in Montgomery in 1955, but Ruby Bridges wouldn't enter her New Orleans elementary school escorted by U.S. Marshalls until 1960. And although the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965 would be landmark successes, the years following *The Rabbits*' Wedding controversy were also marked by great loss: the murder of the four little girls at the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham in 1963, a crime that wouldn't be fully prosecuted until 2002, and the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. at Lorraine Motel in Memphis in 1968, fifty years ago this April.

The characters who populate the play each have stories that matter deeply to them and often these personal stories are connected to well-known books. Children imagine themselves as the rabbits in *Uncle Remus*, a memory of parental love and loss surrounds Tom Sawyer, and a beloved family Bible connects work of civil rights in the present to the prayers of the past. In each case, the context matters as much as the content of the books. The Rabbits' Wedding appeared in the crosshairs of the White Citizens' Council of Montgomery as a book that promoted integration and interracial marriage precisely because of the phone calls, letter writing, and organizing going on at the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church (now named Dexter Avenue King Memorial Baptist Church).

While The Rabbits' Wedding faces intense scrutiny for encouraging children to imagine a racially integrated future, another book that addresses the struggle of African-Americans in a segregated society flies under the radar of the white population of the play. The Green Book, which Joshua considers an essential travel companion, is an important artifact of the era. First published by Victor Hugh Green as The Negro Motorist Green Book in 1936, the book served as a guide for African-American travelers. Between 1936 and 1966, the year of its final publication, the guidebook detailed where it was safe and welcoming to eat, sleep, and gas up your car. To read the entries for the motels, restaurants, service stations, and barbershops in such cities as Toledo, Louisville, Nashville, and Birmingham – the very route that Joshua might drive - is another way to trace our history.

and academic programs for the use of the funds, appoints an advisory committee to review and make recommendations regarding the proposals, and makes awards to the successful proposals. The advisory committee has a representative from the humanities, the social sciences, the natural sciences and the arts faculties of the college. The committee selects a chairperson from among its members. Committee members serve two-year terms and may be reappointed at the discretion of the dean.



When the Tennessee Arts Commission was created in 1967, it was given a special mandate by the General Assembly to stimulate and encourage the presentation of performing, visual and literary arts throughout the state and to encourage public interest in the cultural heritage of Tennessee. Through a variety of programs, the

Commission has encouraged excellence in artistic expression through the state's artists and arts organizations. That commitment has continued to expand through the years to ensure that the citizens of Tennessee have access to, and the opportunity to participate in the arts. These activities give Tennessee citizens a better quality of life, provide our children with a more complete education and attract tourists to our state.

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"We like to describe the library as Main Street for our university," says Dean of Libraries Steve Smith. "It's the center of our academic community, where students and professors meet and exchange ideas." UT's libraries rank 25th among the nation's public research university libraries. Among their resources are special collections ranging from the papers of Alex Haley and Wilma Dykeman to the history of moonshine. A growing number of these collections are available online, including extensive works on the Great Smoky Mountains and UT football programs going back to 1904.
