

christopher oscar peña is a writer originally from California, now residing in Harlem and LA.

His work has been developed or seen at the Goodman Theater, Public Theater, Two River Theater, INTAR, Ontological Hysteric Incubator, Playwrights Realm, Rattlestick Playwrights Theater, Old Vic, Theater For a New City, Orchard Project, Naked Angels, The Flea Theater and New York Theatre Workshop, among many others.

A two time Sundance Institute Theater Fellow (2015 Theater Lab Fellow with *awe/struck*, 2014 UCross Fellow), he has also held Fellowships with the Lark Play Development Center (2014 Playwrights Workshop Fellow, 2012-2013 Van Lier Fellow) was a recipient of the Latino Playwrights Award (*maelstrom*, Kennedy Center), an NYTW Emerging Artist Fellow, Playwrights Realm Writing

Fellow, and was a part of the US/UK Exchange (Old Vic New Voices). He has been commissioned by the Clarence Brown Theatre (*the strangers*), The Goodman Theatre (*awe/struck*), Yale Rep (*How to Make an American Son*), and Cygnet Theater (*alone above a raging sea*).

He's a proud member of New Dramatists, an Artistic Patriot at Merrimack Rep, was named one of "The 1st Annual Future Broadway Power List" by *Backstage*, and was a writer on the Golden Globe nominated, debut season of the CW show, *Jane the Virgin*. His work is published through NoPassport Press and Smith and Krauss. He teaches playwriting at NYU's Tisch School of the Arts and is represented by Heroes and Villains and CAA. Currently, he writes on the critically acclaimed, hit HBO show *Insecure* as well as recurring on screen as Gary. B.A.- University of California, Santa Barbara / M.F.A. New York University, Tisch School of the Arts.

From the Playwright

When the Clarence Brown Theatre commissioned me (almost three years ago) to write a new play for them, I had a lot on my mind. Our first African American president was just going to finish up his tenure, and the possibility of our first Female president was just around the corner. There was this feeling of hope, of possibility, of change – in the right direction. But if I'm being honest, deep down, I was feeling incredibly anxious.

So, I came down to the CBT to meet with this incredible company of artists and spent a week together exploring, experimenting, and collaborating on what would be the beginning ideas that would lead to the play you are watching tonight. That first week was about asking a lot of questions, and having a lot of really difficult conversations. I wasn't sure exactly what I wanted to write, but I knew that I wanted to investigate Thornton Wilder's *Our Town. Our Town*, which premiered exactly eighty years ago this year, is widely regarded as one of the great American classics. The company gathered and we read the play together, multiple times, in hopes of understanding why. For those of you who don't know it, *Our Town* is a three-act meta-theatrical play, set in the fictional town of Grover's Corners between May 1901 and 1913. A stage manager, who serves as a narrator of sorts, introduces us to the town and its many denizens. Ultimately, the play is about many things: the transience of human life, how quickly time passes, and the importance of companionship. The play wants us to slow down, and take stock of our lives. It is the small moments that matter most.

However, when we read the play, most of us had trouble locating ourselves within the narrative. This world, this America, was not one that we recognized. Life, I felt, could only be this simple, this easy, if you were a straight white guy. But where were all the people of color? Where were the immigrants? Where were all the Queer characters? Why did we only ever hear one language? What fantasy life was this? These questions lead to more questions. What are our responsibilities as human beings? What makes a life well lived? Can love survive? Does it even matter? What's more important: a world worth living in? Or a relationship worth living for? Could we truly have both? Are we willing to make sacrifices for the survival of our species, including sacrificing those we love most in the world? Finally, what does it mean to be an American today?

By the time I was finishing it, many of my fears about our current political and cultural moment came true. The idea that a play can change people's minds is a really ambitious one, but if we can at least have more nuanced conversations about our belief systems, preconceived ideas, and assumptions about other people, our history and cultural baggage, then I think I've done my job. This play aims to paint a portrait of America today, and more importantly, to give voice to people you don't often see on stage and on screen. I am an overly educated, first-generation Honduran-American. I've never seen someone like me on stage. It's 2018. We live in turbulent times and much of that comes from the fear of not knowing, of not understanding other people, even within our own America. Sure, some of you might think, that's because they're not American. It's time we got to know each other. This is my America. It's nice to meet you.

From the Director

The production of *the strangers* that you are about to see is a World Premiere. It is the second play commissioned by the Clarence Brown Theatre for students in the Department of Theatre MFA programs. The first was Robert Caisley's *The Open Hand* produced in the Lab Theatre in 2016.

As with the previous commission, *the strangers* was developed over a two-year period in collaboration with the playwright, Christopher Oscar Peña, UT graduate actors, designers, staff and guest artists.

In his first meeting with the actors in 2016, Peña put forth the idea that Thornton Wilder's play *Our Town* might serve as a model, as an inspiration for the new work he would fashion. And, indeed, that came to be. As he says in his introductory notes to *the strangers*, ".... this play can be called many things: a response to, an appropriation of, a remix, an adaptation, a counterpoint, an updating...." of *Our Town*.

Wilder's *Our Town* offers a view of American life in a small town in New Hampshire in 1901, while Peña's *the strangers* depicts life in an anywhere-everywhere-small-town in America in 2018. Although they differ in significant ways, both plays share an interest in the stories of the common man and woman, their families, their homes and their struggles in relationship.

the strangers is populated with characters, mostly young, who struggle to find their way in relationship and in a society in which they often feel unwelcome. They express diverse opinions and speak with a contemporary voice, sometimes raw and provocative, and sometimes touching and lyrical. Some of the characters are widely recognizable, others not so, but all are part of the multicultural fabric of today's America.

It is rare in the theatre to work on a new play; even rarer to work on a play written for us. I can confidently speak for the entire creative team when I say that we are immensely grateful for the opportunity to have worked with Chris Peña on his new play *the strangers*.

The University of Tennessee, Knoxville is one of just 12 universities nationwide with its own professional LORT theatre. The Clarence Brown Theatre Company is a LORT D company and is fully integrated into the Department of Theatre's academic curriculum. Four of the six mainstage productions are produced on the LORT contract, allowing students the opportunity to work with seasoned professionals.

Founded in 1974 with Sir Anthony Quayle as Artistic Director, the Clarence Brown Theatre Company is one of the older companies in the LORT system. It has a distinguished history of hosting artists of national stature including Mary Martin, John Cullum, Zoe Caldwell, Carol Mayo Jenkins, David Keith, Dale Dickey, and Teresa Williams among others.

All Department of Theatre faculty have dual appointments with the professional company in their area of expertise. MFA Performance students may join the Clarence Brown Theatre Company in their third year of study. MFA Design students have the opportunity to work on LORT productions throughout their graduate training.
