

# The Dream of the Burning Boy

A young person dies suddenly. This is the unimaginable at the center of *The Dream* of the Burning Boy by David West Read. Of course, it's stupid to say that this is unimaginable, because the play imagines a school, a town, and a loss so raw and real that it could be our own. Nonetheless, we normally prefer to call a situation like this unimaginable because it's too painful to admit that we can, in fact, imagine it.

In the play, a school community is forced to re-imagine everything. Mr. Larry Morrow, the respected English teacher, cleaves to the great books. He teaches Dante's Divine Comedy, the definitive work of the late medieval Christian imagination. The allegorical poem about the soul's journey to God follows Dante through his vision of Hell, Purgatory, and Heaven. Dante, if you remember from your own school days, doesn't get through this first and final journey alone. He has the virtuous pagan Virgil to guide him out of Hell. After this lesson, Mr. Morrow plans to move onto *Hamlet* in order to continue to teach his students about the universal truths of Western literature.

The traditions of Mr. Morrow's literary canon are countered by his colleague's pile of twentieth-century psychology and counseling resources. Although Steve's books do touch on universal archetypes, they diverge from classical criticism and give us a new language to make sense of ourselves, our thoughts, our fears, and our subliminal wishes. Freud's Interpretation of Dreams, a foundational text

of modern psychology, aims to decipher the meaning of our unconscious imaginations. In Freud's formulation, *Hamlet* is not a tragedy about the problem of existence, but a play that helps us understand psycho-sexual development. There was *Oedipus Rex* before Freud, but no Oedipus complex. The central concepts of Dante and Freud overlap, but they are worlds apart in how they imagine death and desire.

In an after-school meeting, Mr. Morrow's favorite student reveals to us how he sees his own life through the most ridiculous of essay titles. Only a young person has the capacity to imagine himself as the central figure of the present so much so that he can turn the role of Virgil in Dante's *Inferno* into a comical celebration of the self. How the young man sees things, how he imagines his own life, is through an exciting series of firsts, even if they come with or cause conflict. Somewhere between Dante's vision of the afterlife and Freud's examination of the dreamlife, this play asks us to contemplate the firsts. That is, the universal firsts of being a young person and growing up, whether they have already happened, are yet to come, or never do: breaking up, experimenting, becoming a parent, falling in love, meeting a best friend. Friends, teachers, and family wrestle with the most excruciating of firsts as they also recall and experience others. One of these firsts is finally imagined only when the protagonist is lead out of Hell by Freud.

LEAGUE OF RESIDENT THEATRES

The University of Tennessee, Knoxville is one of just 12 universities nationwide with its own professional LORT theatre. The Clarence Brown Theatre Company is a LORT D company and is fully integrated into the Department of Theatre's academic curriculum. Four of the six mainstage productions are produced on the LORT contract, allowing students the opportunity to work with seasoned professionals.

Founded in 1974 with Sir Anthony Quayle as Artistic Director, the Clarence Brown Theatre Company is one of the older companies in the LORT system. It has a distinguished history of hosting artists of national stature including Mary Martin, John Cullum, Zoe Caldwell, Carol Mayo Jenkins, David Keith, Dale Dickey, and Teresa Williams among others.

All Department of Theatre faculty have dual appointments with the professional company in their area of expertise. MFA Performance students may join the Clarence Brown Theatre Company in their third year of study. MFA Design students have the opportunity to work on LORT productions throughout their graduate training.
