

# Barbara Lebow



Barbara Lebow, a California resident, grew up in New York, moved to Atlanta in the 1960s, and joined The Academy Theatre's developmental workshop, eventually becoming playwright in residence. Among her plays with first productions there are A Shayna Maidel, The Left Hand Singing, The Keepers, Cyparis, Little Joe Monaghan, The Adventures of Homer McGundy Revised, Trains, and Tiny Tim is Dead. Her most frequently produced plays are *Plumfield, Iraq, The Left Hand* Singing, Tiny Tim is Dead, and A Shayna Maidel (Off-Broadway 1987-'89), which continues receiving regional and international

productions. In addition to her own writing, Barbara facilitates play creation with disenfranchised segments of the population including homeless and addicted individuals, youth at risk, developmentally and physically disabled persons, and women in prison.

In recent years, she has worked with residents of Los Prietos Boys Camp, supported by a grant from the Fund for Santa Barbara. She has received a Guggenheim Fellowship in Playwriting, a TCG/Pew Theatre Artists Residency, an NEA/TCG Residency, an Atlanta Mayor's Fellowship in the Arts, a Georgia Governor's Award in the Arts, and a Distinguished Service Award from the Santa Barbara County Probation Department.

Her recent plays, The Phenom and Plumfield, Iraq, were developed with assistance from The Playwrights' Center in Minneapolis, receiving workshops there. *Plumfield, Iraq* was developed in part at the University of California Santa Barbara with a PWC New Plays on Campus grant. It premiered at UCSB in May, '08, directed by Risa Brainin. At that time, Barbara was a Michael Douglas Visiting Artist. The play has subsequently been produced at universities around the country. Her play, La Niñera: The Nursemaid, premiered at UCSB in May, '09, also directed by Ms. Brainin. Currently in process: Killing Spiders.

# From the Director

On April 11 and 29, 1945 American troops liberated Buchenwald and Dachau in Germany. By July 1944 and January 1945 Russian troops had already liberated Maidanek and Auschwitz (respectively) in Poland. On April 15, 1945 British and Canadian troops reached Bergen-Belsen. From all accounts the description of the level of human carnage, degradation and suffering was beyond imagining. The atrocities committed against the Jews and other "undesirables" were beyond the scope of human conception and experience. The systematic annihilation of European Jews (Hitler's Final Solution) has been well documented, with thousands of photographs, film clips, and death records that have clearly defined the Holocaust as one of the most horrific acts of genocide the world has ever experienced. This subject matter has been the source material for numerous plays and films as well (Sophie's Choice, Schindler's List, The Pianist). This play, however, is not about the ghettos or the concentration camps. It is not about torture, degradation, murder or misery. It is about survival and the reuniting of a family. It is at its heart a hopeful story.

After the surrender of Germany and the end of the war in Europe there were millions of Displaced Persons (DP's). These people consisted of released prisoners of war, concentration camp survivors (many Jewish) and slave laborers. Where did they go? How were they managed? How were survivors re-connected with living relatives? Many could not return home because their homes had been destroyed or taken by others. The remaining survivors had to find relatives willing to sponsor them from either the United States, Palestine or other countries. The United States finally eased its immigration quotas and began allowing more refugees to enter the country. Many survivors could not talk about their experiences during the war because it was too painful. And many chose not to speak because they were sure no one would actually believe them. But many ultimately did decide to speak out and bear witness to the events so that the world would know exactly what had occurred. These brave individuals felt obligated to speak so that all people would remember and that such a genocide might never be repeated. May 8, 2015 will mark the 70th year since the end of the war in Europe. The story depicted in A Shayna Maidel is a microcosm of the larger events that must have occurred throughout the United States and other countries. This play shows that in spite of the horrific events that occurred during the war, it was still possible for many survivors to gain acceptance and flourish in their new environments. This is a true testament to the human spirit and our ability to overcome insurmountable odds and look forward with faith and hope to a new and changed world.

Founded in 1974 with Sir Anthony Quayle as Artistic Director, the Clarence Brown Theatre Company is one of the older companies in the LORT system.
