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

#### URINETOWN, THE MUSICAL

#### Have you ever paid to pee?

Perhaps you were visiting Europe and stopped somewhere on the autobahn. It was a bit cold inside, but you were quickly distracted by the fact that there were gourmet pastries and cappuccino for sale at a rest stop. And then you went into the W.C. only to discover that you had to suddenly dig change out of your pocket in order to pee. Or maybe you didn't have to pay the money to pee, but you definitely had to pay it to an attendant to wash your hands. You were probably incensed and insulted and embarrassed that you didn't have coins at the ready. Surely, you thought, this pay-to-pee scheme will devolve into a public health crisis of apocalyptic proportions. But then you left the rest stop, enjoyed the rest of your vacation, and returned home to the United States, land of the free toilets, and never gave it another thought.

#### Until now.

Urinetown plays out the apocalyptic scenario that started to cross your mind while you were angrily counting out foreign coins and praying that you made it to the stall in time. On top of that, the musical absurdly rehearses and resurrects iconic moments of rebellion in theatre history. You will likely recognize some flag waving from one particularly epic musical set in France during the June Rebellion. There is also some finger-snapping choreography that will likely remind you of a certain Romeo-and-Juliet story set in 1950s New York. But some other familiar-seeming moments might be harder to place.

The overall structure of *Urinetown* is melodrama-meets-Brecht. The plot features a villain, a hero, and a damsel in distress. There are also confrontation scenes that rather dramatically reveal past secrets. But the musical is also structured on the Epic Theatre created by Bertolt Brecht in the early 20th century. Brecht, who is best known to musical theatre audiences for his collaboration with Kurt Weill on The Threepenny Opera, developed a new type of theatre that rejected Aristotelian dramatic structure. Instead of dialogue, Brecht's theatre depends on narrative. And instead of audiences being drawn in and experiencing emotional connection to the plot, Epic Theatre utilizes distancing effects (verfremdungseffekten) to throw audiences out of the story in order to reflect intellectually on social and political considerations.

In Urinetown, the narration occurs between the episodes of market control, romantic uprising, surprising retribution, ecological disaster, and disappointing platitudes. Following the design of Epic Theatre, Officer Lockstock and Little Sally start, stop, and sometimes analyze the plot of *Urinetown*, but they do so for comical, as much as political, effect. Do not be surprised if you laugh at the most serious implications of sustainability and leave the theatre reflecting on Bobby Strong's hilariously choreographed discovery of the true Urinetown. The virtue of this satirical dystopia is that it is sometimes hard to separate why you laugh from why you think.

But try not to laugh too much or think too hard about criminal urination until intermission.

#### **MARK HOLLMANN**

Mark Hollmann received the Tony Award®, the National Broadway Theatre Award, and the Obie Award for his score to Urinetown the Musical, which had its start in the 1999 New York International Fringe Festival. It won Outer Critics Circle, Drama League, and Lucille Lortel Awards for best musical in addition to garnering 10 Tony Award® nominations. Other shows as composer/ lyricist include Yeast Nation (2011 New York International Fringe Festival, Perseverance Theatre, American Theatre Company, and Ray of Light Theatre),

Bigfoot and Other Lost Souls (Atlantic Stage and Perseverance Theatre), The Man in the White Suit (New York Stage and Film), The Girl, the Grouch, and the Goat (University Theatre, U. of Kansas), Alchemist the Musical (Seattle Fringe Festival), Jack the Chipper (Greenview Arts Center, Chicago), Kabooooom! (University Theater, U. of Chicago), I Think I Can and Deal with It! (Berkshire Theatre Festival), and Fare for All (Mount Vernon Hotel Museum & Garden, NYC). Actor and/or co-writer for the Cardiff Giant Theater (Chicago) productions The Rack, Theater of Funny, The Mercy Ripper, LBJFKKK, Love Me, All Eight Die, and After Taste, the last of which he also directed. TV: songs for Disney Channel's Johnny and the Sprites. He has served on the Tony Nominating Committee, serves on the Council of the Dramatists Guild of America, and is a member of ASCAP. He is also a member of Sure Foundation Lutheran Church in Woodside, Queens, where he serves as a part-time pianist. He and his wife Jilly live in Manhattan with their sons, Oliver and Tucker.





#### **GREG KOTIS**

Greg Kotis wrote the book and co-wrote the lyrics for *Urinetown the Musical*, for which he won two Tony Awards in 2002. His new play, Pig Farm, opened at The Roundabout Theatre in New York City and at The Old Globe Theatre in San Diego in 2006. Currently, he is developing two new musicals with Mark Hollmann: Yeast Nation (the triumph of life), an original story that tells the tale of the dawn of life on Earth, and The Man in the White Suit, a musical version of the 1951 Alec Guiness film. Other plays include Eat the Taste (at

New York's Barrow Street Theatre), Jobey and Katherine, Baron von Siebenburg Melts Through the Floorboards, and Give the People What They Want. Greg lives in Brooklyn with his wife Ayun, his daughter India, and his son Milo.

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When the Tennessee Arts Commission was created in 1967, it was given a special mandate by the General Assembly to stimulate and encourage the presentation of performing, visual and literary arts throughout the state and to encourage public interest in the cultural heritage of Tennessee. Through a variety of programs, the

Commission has encouraged excellence in artistic expression through the state's artists and arts organizations. 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At the Natalie L. Haslam Music Center, rainwater is collected in underground cisterns and used to irrigate the surrounding landscaping. At Orange Hall, rainwater travels through a series of treatment filters into a 35,000-gallon tank and is used for irrigation, toilets, and laundry.

Through the use of innovative landscape planning, the UT campus has 38,000 square feet of permeable pavement that allows rainwater to soak into the ground, mitigating runoff into storm sewers.
