

FROM THE DIRECTOR



HANNAH BENITEZ is a native Miamian now residing between New York and LA. She made the Kilroy's List with her play, *GringoLandia*, which was commissioned and premiered by Zoetic Stage for their 2022 season. She's currently a finalist for American Shakespeare Center's - Shakespeare's New Contemporaries Prize - with her adaptation of *Henry 6*. Other of her produced plays include: *Adaptive Radiation* (Denizen Theatre and American Academy for the Dramatic Arts), *Ashe In Johannesburg* (Burning Coal Theatre), *Dike* (NYTW, Urbanite Theatre and Hofstra University [upcoming]), and coming up, *Killing Fidel* (Miami New Drama

[upcoming]). Dike, was originally developed with The New York Theatre Workshop. She's had workshops and readings with The Playwrights' Center, Artists' Repertory Theater, The Maltz Jupiter Theater and others. She was featured in American Theatre Magazine 6 Theatre Workers You Should Know. She is represented for Theatre by Elaine Devlin Literary Inc, for film/tv by Bash Naran (WME) and managed by Michael Claassen (Writ Large).



Adaptive radiation is a scientific term that defines a process in which organisms rapidly diversify from their ancestral species into a multitude of new forms. This happens when a change in the environment makes new resources available, alters the biotic interactions or releases new environmental niches. Simply put, there must be a change in the environment of the species to change. With that change comes a better chance of survival within the new environment.

This term is often associated with Charles Darwin and the Galapagos finches. A singular species over the course of time developed into six different types of finches with their own unique beaks and dietary needs from the adaption to the change.

In this play, the environmental change is the Spec, a little orb of something other worldly. The catalyst is undefined, unknown, and takes the four millennials on a journey of magical proportions. The Spec remains undefined to both us and the characters in question. If the millennial spiral and existentialism are core antagonists to the show, the Spec is the foil. Its journey from Mel to Olivia, to Steve and Robert's rediscovery of his Spec radiates change in each individual's character arc, while connecting them through a new environmental change.

This combination of the scientific reality and the surrealism of what is means to be in a generation defined by upheaval and ruin create a world much like our own, and not in Benitez's *Adaptive Radiation*.

What is Magic?

Magic is defined as the "application of beliefs, rituals or actions employed in the belief that they can manipulate natural or supernatural beings or forces. It is a category into which have been placed various beliefs and practices sometimes considered separate from both religion and science".

Meet Melanie, Olivia, Steve, and Robert, the four **Millennials** in our play. At the start they share one thing in common. They have lost the magic they had from their youth. Their "baggage" and search for economic and personal satisfaction have led them to an existential crisis. They claim that they've "done all the right things" for success, and yet their lives are unfulfilled. They are at a turning point. **Magic** is nowhere to be found. Or is it?

Adaptive Radiation is about a journey. What our four **Millennials** discover during this journey is what you are about to see. This play is a play. It is also magic. Enjoy!

(Robert) Chris is very excited to be apart of this production. He is a sophomore at the College of Business majoring in Finance. He wants to thank all his







City of Knoxville - Knoxville's roots run deep and strong.

The city has served as the hub of the region since its founding in 1791. The best of its Appalachian heritage remains today — a strong work ethic, a family-centered community, and an intense respect for the natural beauty that envelopes the region. The metropolitan Knoxville area was ranked the "best place to live in the United States and Canada" among cities with

a population of fewer than 1 million. The ranking came from the Millennium edition of Places Rated Almanac. The results confirmed what most in this area have known for a long time - Knoxville is one of the best cities in the country!



Knox County Tourism Consortium

The Clarence Brown Theatre is a proud member of the **Arts & Culture Alliance's Knox County Tourism Consortium**, joining with 25 other art and heritage non-profits to attract and entertain more than 1.3 million people annually from countries as distant and diverse as Japan, New Zealand, the Russian Federation, Liberia, the Netherlands, and across South America. With support from the Hotel Motel Tax Fund, the Consortium contracts with Knox County to present more than 4,200 visitor-focused events and activities throughout the year.



The Department of the Treasury is the executive agency responsible for promoting economic prosperity and ensuring the financial security of the United States. The Department is responsible for a wide range of activities such as advising the President on economic and financial issues, encouraging sustainable economic growth, and fostering improved governance in financial institutions. The Department of the Treasury operates and maintains systems that are critical to the nation's

financial infrastructure, such as the production of coin and currency, the disbursement of payments to the American public, revenue collection, and the borrowing of funds necessary to run the federal government. The Department works with other federal agencies, foreign governments, and international financial institutions to encourage global economic growth, raise standards of living, and to the extent possible, predict and prevent economic and financial crises. The Treasury Department also performs a critical and far-reaching role in enhancing national security by implementing economic sanctions against foreign threats to the U.S., identifying and targeting the financial support networks of national security threats, and improving the safeguards of our financial systems.

The Mildred Haines and William Elijah Morris Lecture Endowment supports campus visits of lecturers and scholars in all disciplines in the College of Arts and Sciences. The dean of the college solicits proposals from departments and academic programs for the use of the funds, appoints an advisory committee to review and make recommendations regarding the proposals, and makes awards to the successful proposals. The advisory committee has a representative from the humanities, the social sciences, the natural sciences and the arts faculties of the college. The committee selects a chairperson from among its members. Committee members serve two-year terms and may be reappointed at the discretion of the dean.



Knox County is a county in the U.S. state of Tennessee. As of the 2010 census, the population is 432,226. Its county seat and largest city is Knoxville. The county is at the geographical center of the Great Valley of East Tennessee. Near the heart of the county is the origin of the Tennessee River at the union of the Holston and French Broad Rivers. Knox County was created on June 11, 1792 by Governor William Blount from parts of Greene and Hawkins counties, and has the distinction of being one of only eight counties created during territorial administration. It is one of nine United States counties named for

American Revolutionary War general and first United States Secretary of War Henry Knox. Parts of Knox County later became Blount (1795), Anderson (1801), Roane (1801), and Union (1850) counties.



The Shubert Foundation, Inc., was established in 1945 by Lee and J.J. Shubert, in memory of their brother Sam and is dedicated to sustaining and advancing the live performing arts in the United States, with a particular emphasis on theatre

and a secondary focus on dance. The **Tennessee Arts Commission**, was created in 1967 by the Tennessee General Assembly with the special mandate to stimulate and encourage the presentation of the visual, literary, music and performing arts and to encourage public interest in the cultural heritage of Tennessee.
