MARGARET ATWOOD

Margaret Atwood was born in 1939 in Ottawa, and grew up in northern Ontario and Quebec, and in Toronto. She received her undergraduate degree from Victoria College at the University of Toronto and her master's degree from Radcliffe College.

Margaret Atwood is the author of more than forty books of fiction, poetry, and critical essays. Her latest book of short stories is Stone Mattress: Nine Tales (2014). Her MaddAddam trilogy - the Giller and Booker prize-nominated Oryx and Crake (2003), The Year of the Flood (2009), and MaddAddam (2013) - is currently being adapted for HBO. *The Door* is her latest volume of poetry (2007). Her most recent non-fiction books are Payback: Debt and the Shadow Side of Wealth (2008) and In Other Worlds: SF and the Human Imagination (2011). Her novels include The Blind Assassin, winner of the Booker Prize: Alias Grace, which won the Giller Prize in Canada and the Premio Mondello in Italy; and *The Robber* Bride, Cat's Eye, The Handmaid's Tale – which became a TV series

with MGM and Hulu - and The Penelopiad. Her new novel, The Heart Goes Last, was published in September 2015. Forthcoming in 2016 are Hag-Seed, a novel revisitation of Shakespeare's play The Tempest, for the Hogarth Shakespeare Project, and Angel Catbird - with a cat-bird superhero - a graphic novel with co-creator Johnnie Christmas (Dark Horse Comics). Margaret Atwood lives in Toronto with writer Graeme Gibson.

GRACE MARKS, 31, convicted of murdering Nancy Montgomery and Thomas Kinnear, but has amnesia of the events in question. Imprisoned for her crimes when she was just sixteen, Grace has been incarcerated for fifteen years, following the commutation of her original sentence to death by hanging.

SIMON JORDAN, 35, American psychologist. Simon has spent a great deal of time researching and advocating for humane treatment of the mentally ill, and has plans to open a private asylum in his native United States.

MRS. RACHEL LAVELL, 54, wife of the Governor of Kingston Penitentiary. Endlessly curious but stifled by her gender, Mrs. Lavell enjoys taking on "projects".

MARY WHITNEY, 16, Grace's close friend from her first service position in the Alderman Parkinson home.

NANCY MONTGOMERY, 24, Thomas Kinnear's housekeeper.

JEREMIAH, a traveling peddler.

THOMAS KINNEAR, 32, gentleman and businessman, Grace's employer.

JAMES MCDERMOTT, 21, stable-hand to Thomas Kinnear.

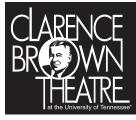
JENNIFER BLACKMER

Jennifer Blackmer is the 2015 PEN/Laura Pels International Foundation for Theatre Emerging American playwright. Based in the Midwest, she is a Professor of Theatre and Associate Provost for Entrepreneurial Learning at Ball State University. Her plays have been seen in New York, Los Angeles, Minneapolis, Indianapolis, Berkeley and St. Louis, and her work has been developed by Seven Devils, Activate Midwest, Nashville's Ingram New Works Lab, Illinois Shakespeare Festival and The Lark. Plays include *Human Terrain* (Mustard Seed Theatre, 5th Wall Theatre, Broken Nose Theatre), *Unraveled* (Theatre Unbound, Nashville Repertory Theatre), *Alias Grace* (Ball State University, Illinois Shakespeare Festival); *Delicate Particle Logic*

(Indra's Net, The Playwrights' Center, Break-a-Leg Productions at CUNY Graduate Center, NYC), and *Borrowed Babies* (Activate Midwest). Jennifer's screenplay for *Human Terrain* is a 2016 winner of the Tribeca Film Institute/Alfred P. Sloan Foundation Filmmaker Fund. Her work has been a finalist for the David Charles Horn Prize for Emerging Playwrights (Yale Drama Competition), the Fratti-Newman Political Play Contest, the Firehouse Festival of New American Theatre, the O'Neill National Playwrights' Conference and Jennifer was shortlisted for the Princess Grace Award and the Shakespeare's Sister Fellowship. She is currently developing *Human Terrain* as a motion picture with B Powered Films in Los Angeles. Recent directing credits include the American premiere of *Lost: A Memoir* at Indiana Repertory Theatre, and numerous productions at Ball State University.



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FROM THE DIRECTOR

The journey of working with Jennifer Blackmer on this adaptation of Alias Grace - a book we both love by a writer we both love - over the last 3 years is hard to encapsulate into a trenchant, concise director's note. I know because I've written and deleted at least 7 almost completed notes. The story belongs to Grace and Jen and, of course, Ms. Atwood. I cannot improve on it with an explanation of how or why we did what we did. Ms. Atwood is a brilliant writer and created a brilliant character in Grace. Jen is also a brilliant writer who imagined a telling of this story for the stage. She rigorously and doggedly sifted through the book and a created a script that is a theatrical distillation of this wide ranging novel. And I am the one lucky enough to be given the chance to bring Grace's story to life. So, I will let our Grace speak for herself.

Because all adaptations end up leaving so many wonderful words unused, below are some of my favorite quotes from the book that don't reside in our theatrical telling.

The college's twenty-one academic departments and schools, eight centers and institutes, and thirteen interdisciplinary programs span the disciplines of the humanities,

social sciences, natural sciences, and the visual and performing arts. The college is also home to the Language and World Business Program and the College Scholars Program. There are 640 fulltime-equivalent (FTE) instructional faculty in the college which includes 420 research- active tenure-track faculty and 219 non-tenure track faculty.

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The Alliance was created in 1998 to raise awareness of the integral role women play in philanthropy at the University of Tennessee. Today the group has more than 4,250 members nationwide and is recognized as one of the UT System's most active and well-respected volunteer groups. In fact, universities across the nation have modeled their women's philanthropy groups after the Alliance, fostering a sense of unity and pride among their female donors.



Knoxville's roots run deep and strong. The city has served as the hub of the region since its founding in 1791. The best of its Appalachian heritage remains today — a strong work ethic, a family-centered community, and an intense respect for the natural beauty that envelopes the region. The metropolitan Knoxville area was ranked the "best place to live in the United States and Canada" among cities with a population of fewer than 1 million. The ranking

The Mildred Haines and William Elijah Morris Lecture Endowment supports campus visits of lecturers and scholars in all disciplines in the College of Arts and Sciences. The dean of the college solicits proposals from departments and academic programs for the use of the funds, appoints an advisory committee to review and make recommendations

regarding the proposals, and makes awards to the successful proposals. The advisory committee has a representative from the humanities, the social sciences, the natural sciences and the arts faculties of the college. The committee selects a chairperson from among its members. Committee members serve two-year terms and may be reappointed at the discretion of the dean.



When the Tennessee Arts Commission was created in 1967, it was given a special mandate by the General Assembly to stimulate and encourage the presentation of performing, visual and literary arts throughout the state and to encourage public interest in the cultural heritage of Tennessee. Through a variety of programs, the Commission has encouraged excellence in artistic expression through the state's artists and arts organizations. That commitment has continued to

expand through the years to ensure that the citizens of Tennessee have access to, and the opportunity to participate in the arts. These activities give Tennessee citizens a better quality of life, provide our children with a more complete education and attract tourists to our state.
